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Preparing for the Skills Future, Now - The world's experts in vocational education gather in Melbourne

Experts in vocational education and training from across the world will gather in Melbourne next week to examine how the world is preparing for the rapidly changing nature of work.

TAFE Directors Australia CEO and Chair of the World Federation Craig Robertson said that Australia is extremely fortunate to have such a large number of high-quality experts in the field assembling on our shores.

They will be attending the World Federation of Colleges and Polytechnics biennial congress from 8 to 10 October. The theme of the congress is *Preparing for the Skills Future, Now*. It will explore the impact of advances in technologies and automation on vocational and professional education across the world.

The Congress has attracted more than 750 delegates.

"Delegates can expect to hear some thought-provoking presentations about the threats to jobs, skills and training as we know them and how our education and training systems must be redesigned to prepare students for the jobs of the future," Mr Robertson said.

Mr Robertson said the global impact of new technology and automation is already profound.

"Australia is not immune to this and urgent action is needed by government and industry to ensure we are better prepared," he said.

The congress will also examine the impact on work, societies and peoples who may be displaced due to changing economic and global circumstances.

The 2018 World Congress will focus on action-based solutions to these challenges and will make a difference to the outcomes of millions of vocational and professional students world-wide, he said.

It will also provide an opportunity for Australia to look at its vocational education and training system from the outside in and compare its readiness for future challenges with other countries' systems.
